The Cowboys / John Williams (b. 1932) trans, Jav Bocook

The Cowboys is a typical example of John Williams's capacity to enrich a film story with an almost narrative musical score. Through music, we are transported to the Old West and experience the joys and hardships of cowboy life. Taken from the 1972 motion picture, *The Cowboys*, the music complements the story of a 60-year-old Montana cattleman who enlists (and ultimately mentors) ten schoolboys as cowboys after the regular ranch hands have left with Gold Rush fever. The 400-mile cattle drive provides the boys with a different and harsher schooling as they learn the rigors of the job and have to deal with rustlers. The music conveys the high spirit of wild horses and their taming. Jollity around the campfire is contrasted against the loneliness of the open range. The plains have a beauty, though, which is reflected in the song of a lark. The hard work of the cattle drive, including the fording of the wide, muddy river and dealing with many fears and threats, succeeds in maturing the boys into men.

Sonoran Desert Holiday / Ron Nelson (b. 1929)

Following a long and distinguished career at Brown University, composer Ron Nelson retired to Scottsdale, Arizona, and used his experiences in the American Southwest as inspiration for this work. While many of his overtures were originally composed for orchestra and later transcribed for wind band, *Sonoran Desert Holiday* was written specifically for the wind band medium.

Deep River / Benjamin Horne (b. 1995)

Deep River is an arrangement of the traditional spiritual of the same name for wind band. This arrangement is inspired by a popular art song version by Henry Burleigh. His low baritone voice as well as renditions by singers such as Paul Robeson are the motivation for this version's use of solo tuba for the song's initial presentation. Other allusions to Burleigh can be found throughout this work. The lyrics are:

> Deep river, my home is over Jordan. Deep river, Lord, I want to cross over into campground

Hoe-Down from "Rodeo" / Aaron Copland (1900-1990) arr. Mark Rogers

The Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo commissioned the choreographer Agnes de Mille and the composer Aaron Copland to collaborate on the creation of a western ballet for its 1942-43 season. Originally sub-titled "The Courting at Burnt Ranch," *Rodeo* was first produced at the Metropolitan Opera House on October 16, 1942, with scenery by Oliver Smith and costumes by Kermit Love.

The idea for the ballet was devised by Miss de Mille who described it as follows: "Throughout the American Southwest, the Saturday afternoon rodeo is a tradition. On the remote ranches, as well as in the trading centers and the towns, the 'hands' get together to show off their skills in roping, riding, branding, and throwing. Often, on the more isolated ranches, the rodeo is done for an audience that consists only of a handful of fellow-workers, women-folk, and those nearest neighbors who can make the eighty or so mile run-over. The afternoon's exhibition is usually followed by a Saturday night dance at the Ranch House. The theme of the ballet is basic. It deals with the problem that has confronted all American women, from earliest pioneer times, and which has never ceased to occupy them throughout the history of the building of our country: how to get a suitable man."

The music was written in June and orchestrated in September, 1942. The composer subsequently extracted an orchestral suite from the ballet score for concert performance under the title, *Four Dance Episodes from Rodeo: I. Buckaroo Holiday, II. Corral Nocture, III. Saturday Night Waltz, IV. Hoe-down*. A number of American folk songs are woven into the score. Source material was drawn from *Our Singing Country* by John A. and Alan Lomax and Ira Ford's *Traditional Music of America*. A square dance tune called "Bonyparte" provides the principal theme of *Hoe-down*.

Sasparilla / John Mackey (b. 1973)

Sasparilla was a type of liquor served in saloons in the old west. It has since become a non-alcoholic root beer-like beverage, and if the listener happens to be under the age of 21, I suggest you choose the latter description. Whether it be from bad liquor of terribly funky soda, *Sasparilla* tells the tale of an Old West saloon, and the specific tale seems to vary, depending on the listener. Some hear a pony who drinks from a fermented trough and goes on a joyride to Tijuana. Some hear a cowboy who can't hold his drink. Some suggest the old west as viewed through the eyes of the old Warner Brothers cartoons.

Scott C. Tobias currently holds the position of Director of Bands and Associate Professor of Music at West Virginia University where his responsibilities include conducting the WVU Wind Symphony, teaching undergraduate and graduate courses in conducting, and providing administrative leadership for the WVU Bands program. Prior to his appointment at West Virginia University, Dr. Tobias served as Director of Bands at the University of Central Florida and as Associate Director of Bands at Appalachian State University. He also previously served as a high school band director in the public schools of Georgia and South Carolina.

Bands under Dr. Tobias' direction have performed nationally and internationally at events such as the New York Wind Band Festival in Carnegie Hall, the Western International Band Clinic, the Cabalgata de Reyes (Madrid, Spain), and the London New Year's Day Parade. Dr.

Tobias remains active as a guest conductor and clinician conducting collegiate honor bands, all-state bands, and district honor bands throughout the United States. Additionally, he has presented sessions at conferences including the Midwest International Band and Orchestra Clinic, the Florida Music Educators Association Conference, and the West Virginia Music Educators Association Conference.

Dr. Tobias is a recipient of the National Band Association Citation of Excellence and has been named to Who's Who Among America's Teachers. While at Appalachian State University, he was also recognized with the University of North Carolina Board of Governors Excellence in Teaching Award as well as the Hayes School of Music Outstanding Teacher Award.

Dr. Tobias is a Past President of the National Band Association and currently serves as the Executive Secretary of that organization. He also serves as Past President of the Big 12 Band Directors Association. In March of 2022, Dr. Tobias was elected to membership in the prestigious American Bandmasters Association.

A native of South Carolina, Dr. Tobias earned the Bachelor of Music degree in Music Education from Furman University, and both the Master of Music Education degree and the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Conducting from the University of Georgia.
