#### Icarus and Daedalus / Keith Gates (1948-2007)

*carus and Daedalus* was commissioned by the United States Air Force Band of Flight in 1992 and received its world premiere(s) at the Indiana and Ohio Music Educators Association Conferences in Indianapolis, Indiana, and Cincinnati, Ohio, in January 1993.

The Greek mythological character, Daedalus, a descendent of Erechtheus, King of Athens, was the world's first aviator. He was also the most ingenious artist and inventor of the age, responsible for developing the axe, wedge, wimble, level, sails for ships, and many other mechanical instruments. According to Greek legend, Talos, Daedalus' nephew, promised to be as ingenious an inventor as his uncle so Daedalus killed him. Fearing for his own life, Daedalus fled Athens with his son, lcarus, and settled in Crete. There, Daedalus was ordered by King Minos to build the famous labyrinth. Later imprisoned in the labyrinth by the King, Daedalus was able to escape the island by making a set of wings out of wax and feathers for himself and his son. Icarus, however, flew too near the sun, the wax joints on his wings melted, and he fell into the (Icarian) sea, named after him. Daedalus arrived safely, but sorrowfully, in Sicily.

#### First Flights / Roger Cichy (b. 1956)

December 17, 1903, a most important day in history, is the subject of composer Roger Cichy's *First Flights*. The work is a musical portrait of the events occurring as humankind broke the bonds of the earth and took to the air for the first time in powered flight. On a sandy beach on the North Carolina coastline with Orville Wright piloting the Kittyhawk "Flyer," Wilbur Wright, along with five others, witnessed the extraordinary event that would impact the world from that day on.

The first two movements of *First Flights* can be considered impressionistic in nature, creating images of their titles. "Morning's Cold / A Day for History" represents the conditions of things as daylight broke on December 17, 1903. From the morning's icy cold conditions to the Wright Brothers' state of mind after an unsuccessful attempt a few days earlier, this movement builds in optimism and hope as the two brothers put their years of experimentation on the line. The image of the Kittyhawk "Flyer" is portrayed in the second movement. One can only guess what it would have been like when the hangar door swung open and the first bit of daylight appeared on the fabric wings of a machine that would start humankind on the road to powered flight. This movement also serves as a reflection of the many accomplishments that resulted in the creation of the Kittyhawk "Flyer."

The final movement is highly programmatic and musically portrays the events of the first flights. A summary of these events is as follows: The "Flyer" is pulled out of the hangar and prepared for another attempt. Four men and a teenager arrive to help with the flight. The men help with

the last minute preparations and instructions are given to Mr. Daniels by Orville to operate a box camera, which is necessary to prove the flight if it is successful. The propellers are spun, the engine sputters and churns, and Orville climbs into the craft for the attempt. Amongst the noise, smoke, and vibrations, Orville nervously goes through a control check and finally pulls the lever that releases the restraining rope. The "Flyer" rolls down the track and triumphantly becomes airborne. Along with the mood of celebration and jubilance, a moment of reflection occurs. The Wright Brothers made four flights that day. Orville alternated with Wilbur as pilot. After the final flight, the me were standing around conversing among themselves when a strong gust of wind suddenly appeared, took the "Flyer" and destroyed it. Despite the later event, the triumph of success and accomplishment make December 17, 1903, a day to remember. The title of the final movement, "Success four flights..." comes from the first sentence of a telegram that the Wright Brothers sent to inform their father of their success.

### Lord, Guard and Guide / Robert Jager (b. 1939)

ord, Guard and Guide (The Men Who Fly) was commissioned by the Military Airlift Command Band, Scott Air Force Base, Illinois. Lt. Colonel Bruce Gilkes was the Commander/ Conductor of the MAC Band at the time of commissioning.

The hymn "Quebec" forms the basis for this composition. This melody is the source of the music for the United States Air Force hymn, "Lord, Guard and Guide." Using fragments of the hymn-tune, the composition begins with gradually rising lines as the music begins to take flight. This is followed by soaring lines and harmonies that attempt to describe the feelings of wonder associated with being free from the earth. A quiet interlude, primarily for solo woodwinds and percussion, portrays the serenity of life among the clouds. Culminating the work are two settings of the hymn-tune, first for the woodwinds alone, and then for the low woodwinds and brass in combination. A short coda brings back fragments from the "soaring theme" and acts as an amen to the composition.

#### Into the Air! / Timothy Mahr (b. 1956)

The overture *Into the Air!* was commissioned by the United States Air Force Band, Colonel Lowell Graham, conductor. The composition was completed in September 1998 and premiered by the United States Air Force Band on July 11, 1999. The premiere took place during the finale concert of the 9th International World Association for Symphonic Bands and Ensembles Conference.

As I began working on this composition, I found myself often thinking abou the unselfish courage exhibited by the members of the United States Air Force, as well as the absolute thrill it is to be able to fly. Hopefully the music embodies these noble qualities of character and experience.
